

SYNOPSIS

He is known as the "Trump of the tropics," the "Cavalo," the uncontrollable horseman, the disruptive populist, or even "The Myth." Known for his anti-communist rhetoric, his provocative words on Amazonia, the dictatorship, women, homosexuality, firearms, and now for his seemingly unreadable governance. Yet, he is a political figure far more complex than the grotesque portrait painted of him. Supported by the country's various conservative forces he is already gearing up for the 2022 elections. And he has no doubts about its outcome: "I will leave the presidential palace in 2027!".

Portrait of a man that no one expected but who did not come to power by chance. A man whose journey tells the story of an entirely different Brazil.



TREATMENT

In October 2022, the former cavalry captain will probably face Lula, the fallen ex-president who has now been cleared of all charges. Two opposing sides, irreconcilable. Today Brazil is more divided than ever, and Jair Bolsonaro, despite a disastrous record, both on the management of the pandemic and the economy, continues to receive overwhelming support with a staggering 30% popularity. In front of tens of thousands of supporters at the beginning of September, the Brazilian president addresses the crowd and declares: "Only God can remove me from power."

For the first time, close friends and advisers of Jair Bolsonaro speak out on camera. His lifelong friend, political comrades, his son, Flavio, ministers of his government, and some former allies.

This film tells the story of Bolsonaro's childhood, education, and military training as told by his childhood friend, João Evangelista Correa. Anecdotes of the daily life of a provincial town depict the young Bolsonaro from the small middle class in a post-dictatorship Brazil haunted by anti-communism but also by the hatred of the upper class and the wealthy. A few years later, he joined the army, appearing to be a rebel being the worst of his unit. Hierarchy is not his business, but order is.

The young Jair was already full of contradictions, and it was Waldir Ferraz, his shadow advisor who witnessed his political debut. An insignificant deputy for thirty years, he especially distinguished himself during the impeachment of ex-president Dilma Rousseff by declaring that the dictatorship's generals had done well in torturing her. Familiar with provocative language against women and LGBTQ community, who could have ever imagined that he would end up being Brazil's president?

One thing is sure: he did not come to power by chance. He is supported by the old power structure, the landowners, the evangelicals, and the armed forces. The famous BBB: Bible, Beef, and Bullets. They are the ones who made his election possible. Since then, he has governed by mixing his convictions, his obsessions, and their expectations. These sometimes conflicting currents explain his chaotic governance.

On the one hand, the ideological, conservative, anti-communist, and anti-Chinese wing is led by evangelical lobbies whose scope is mainly national—on the other. On the other hand the branch that defends economic pragmatism and puts commercial interests before ideology is driven by agricultural and industrial legislation. Between these two fronts, the military, which entered the government for the first time since 1985 (9 ministerial appointments) claiming to be the guardian of national interest and diplomatic stability, and who has its own political agenda.

Bolsonaro is constantly playing both sides of the fence, sometimes liberal to appeal to the elites who run the country, occasionally ultra-conservative to appeal to his electoral base. But, tactical or not, this duality has its challenges.

As he enters his final year in office, the former cavalry captain is now at a crossroad, facing risky and crucial choices, each involving significant sacrifices and each potentially costing him his seat or his re-election.

This film mixes interviews, originally shot material, archives, and very cinematographic illustrations. We explore Jair Bolsonaro's values through his political ambitions and obsessions. Members of his cabinet, opposing voices from civil society and observers will help us revisit his first term in office. In the background, the film portrays Bolsonaro's Brazil and its post-dictatorship generation.

This film echoes the international news: the rise to power of a populist, anti-progressist, and retrograde politician who has brought to light another face of Brazil. His election gave a voice to those who felt under represented and released homophobic and racist instincts in the country. Brazil's diversity is under attack. Unfortunately, no country is safe from such a fate.
